#### INTRODUCTION

The Tri-County Council for Western Maryland (TCCWMD), operating as an Appalachian Regional Commission Local Development District (LDD) and an Economic Development Administration Economic Development District (EDD), represents a working partnership of federal, state, and local governments. Tri-County Council serves three counties and twenty-four municipalities.

The Council is a currently funded grantee of the Economic Development Administration and Appalachian Regional Commission planning assistance funds. In conformance with their program guidelines, the Tri-County Council utilizes planning assistance funds for administrative expenses which directly support the formulation and implementation of economic development programs. These economic development programs are designed to create or retain full-time permanent jobs and improve income characteristics, particularly for the unemployed and under-employed, in the most distressed areas of the region.

The work program of the organization is specifically designed to enhance the quality of economic development activities in the region, strengthen relationships among the various units of government, and enhance public awareness. This strategy is achieved by the delivery of quality economic development activities and products in a timely manner and by coordinating the goals, objectives, and programs of Tri-County Council with other agencies in Western Maryland.



#### LOAN FUND PROGRAMS

Western Maryland Revolving Loan Fund is a pool of money granted by federal and state entities for the purpose of making loans to create and/or save jobs. The Revolving Loan Fund serves as a source of gap financing for small businesses seeking to locate or expand in Maryland's Garrett, Allegany, and Washington counties. Established in 1980, the program has facilitated the creation and expansion of businesses that have created or saved jobs in the Appalachian region. The program operates by participating with banks and other lenders to assist in financing a business project.

The **State Lottery Terminal (SLoT) Fund** - Maryland law provides for 1.5% of the proceeds generated from video lottery terminals (slots) to be contributed to the State Lottery Terminal Account. Tri-County Council serves as a Fund Manager for the Department of Commerce to lend those funds to qualified small, minority and women-owned businesses with a focus on the Western Maryland Region.

**Dotson's Contracting** started as a seasonal lawn care business but quickly became a year-round business due to high demand for snow plowing and removal. In 2013, the company expanded service to offer work in masonry, excavating, foundations and footers, and landscape design. As the company continued to grow, it needed to find storage space for the equipment and materials. A property became available that would not only house the equipment but also was already an income producing property and had a finished welding shop. "Our loan was approved and required 10% down payment. This was extremely helpful to our business because we were able to continue funding materials to continue the masonry portion of our business, without requiring our customers to prepay construction jobs. Business sales grew 20% in 2018, with the help from the SLoT program." -Bruce Dotson, Owner

True Respite Brewing Company Derwood, Maryland




True Respite Brewing Company opened to the public operating a 3 vessel, 15-barrel brewhouse. They develop recipes, brew product, package in kegs and cans, and then sell their products in their own tap room as well as distribute off-site. "As young entrepreneurs gaining access to capital was extremely difficult. We were denied by many different conventional lenders. It was a painstaking process. We contacted Tri County Council to learn more about the SLoT program and found that they were extremely welcoming, easy to communicate with, and took the time to listen to our story. #### CERTIFIED DEVELOPMENT COMPANY

In the late 1970s the Federal Government recognized that small businesses were having a difficult time accessing the capital they need to start up and expand. Tri-County Council began serving as an agent to lend money under several of these programs in the early 1980s after factories across the country were beginning to close their doors and unemployment and interest rates were skyrocketing. Since that time the Council has expanded their programs several times including the Maryland MEAF program in the early 2000s and the Maryland VLT program in 2016.

In 2018 the Council recognized that the region was severely underserved in offering the SBA 504 lending program which specializes in the purchase of fixed assets such as real estate, machinery and equipment at below market rates. The program also offers the ability to fund projects ten times larger than the maximum loan amount the Council currently can provide. While Maryland is served by several Development Companies, only one is located in the State in Prince George's County. Much like our other programs, the SBA 504 Program requires working with traditional lenders and would offer much needed exposure to our current lending programs.



From 1996-2017, there were 949 SB504 loans throughout the State; this includes 5 loans in Allegany County, 3 loans in Garrett County, 26 loans in Washington County. Since October 1, 2017 there have been no SB504 loans in the three Western Counties compared to forty-five loans state-wide despite record low interest rates.

Since the 504 Program must be operated through a 501(c)3, the Council has taken steps to utilize the Summit Development Corporation, a non-profit already in place, to make application to be considered as a Certified Development Corporation. Initially it was envisioned that application would be made in 2019, but due to the complexity of the program and required amendments to the 501(c)3 more time was needed for due diligence prior to moving forward.

However, significant strides were made during 2019 including staff training, identifying individuals to serve on the Board of Directors and finalizing the required policies and procedures. Additional steps still need to be taken to modify the service area of the 501(c)3, address fiscal year consistencies, amend the by-laws and the articles of incorporation with the State, and perhaps even a name change to better describe the new 504 lending focus of the non-profit.

We will continue to move forward with the formation of this powerful economic development tool in 2020 to bring expanded services to our Western Maryland businesses and additional options to our local lenders. Pursuit of this new program would not be possible without the support of the Rural Maryland Council and the Maryland Department of Commerce as well as the guidance from the Small Business Administration.

#### ANNUAL INVESTMENT PACKAGE

Tri-County Council seeks projects annually through its points of contact in the three Western Maryland counties of Allegany, Garrett, and Washington. The County points of contact reach out to all government agencies, non-profit organizations, municipalities, and educational institutions for possible projects for the upcoming federal fiscal year.

The counties evaluate, rank and submit their projects to Tri-County Council for consideration. The Council, in partnership with the ARC Program Manager, reviews the projects for consistency with the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) Goals and Objectives. Those projects that meet these criteria are used to form the Annual Investment Package for the region. The Package is then ratified at the June TCC Board of Directors meeting and forwarded to ARC. Priority projects are invited to make application at the beginning of the Federal Fiscal Year.

## COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY

The Tri-County Council for Western Maryland is designated by the US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA) as the Economic Development District (EDD) and regional planning organization. As an EDD, the Council is required to prepare a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) every five years. Annual updates to the document are required for EDA funding of economic development projects.

The CEDS is a strategy-driven plan for regional economic development. These economic development programs create or retain full-time permanent jobs and improve income characteristics, particularly for the unemployed and under-employed citizens of the region. Established by local representatives from public, private and non-profit sectors of the three Western Maryland counties, the document follows the CEDS Content Guidelines released by the Economic Development Administration.

#### **Project Development Assistance**

Tri-County Council for Western Maryland staff assists applicants, when appropriate, in planning and developing projects culminating in the Investment Package or other federal applications outside the ARC-EDA investment process. The LDD staff continues to update and refine their project submittal guidelines on an ongoing basis, and plans for increased technical assistance to be delivered at project point-of-contact levels. The Council works with many applicants to ensure that competitive proposals are submitted that will have the greatest chance of success in bringing both economic impact and grant funds into the region.



#### **United Way** of Washington County, MD

The United Way of Washington County received a \$15,000 ARC grant to support the Western Maryland Nonprofit Professional **Development Opportunities** Project. Over a two-year period, some 200 nonprofit professionals will increase their individual capacity and skills to manage nonprofit organizations. As a result, the capacity of 75 nonprofit organizations will be improved.



The Appalachian Regional Commission approved \$95,000 to the Allegany College of Maryland Allied Health Training Program. The project will improve 467 students by preparing the regional workforce for allied health careers.



The ARC approved a \$197,500 grant to the Town Council of Grantsville for the Springs Road Infrastructure. The new water and sewer service will help support the construction of 36 new households and four businesses.

#### MARYLAND TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION

Tri-County Council for Western Maryland serves as a Regional Coordinating Body for the Maryland Transit Administration (MTA). The Council represents Western Maryland and includes Garrett, Allegany, and Washington Counties, as well as rural parts of Frederick County and has the responsibility under the provisions of The Fixing America's Surface Transportation (<u>FAST</u>) Act for developing and carrying out a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation process for the region. With funding from the Federal Transit Administration, the MTA will disburse these funds to successful applicants who qualify for the 5310 Program.

Funding for the 5310 grant program is on a two-year cycle. FY20-FY21 applications that were endorsed by the Western Maryland Scoring Committee were forwarded to MTA in December 2018. MTA ranked and forwarded all statewide applications to MTA Capital Programming in March 2019. Awards were announced in June 2019 with 11 Western Maryland human service providers receiving \$1,740,447 in 5310 funds matched with \$929,554 in local funds for a total of \$2,670,001. Assistance included new vehicles and operations, preventative maintenance, and mobility management.

TCCWMD is a member of the Transportation Association of Maryland (TAM) and also participates in the Allegany County Transportation Task Force, Washington County Transit Advisory Committee, and the Frederick County Transit Advisory Committee.

#### WESTERN MARYLAND FIBER PROJECT

Tri Council County received a grant in the amount of \$242,000 from the Maryland Department of Commerce Advantage Maryland Fund, better known as the MEDAAF Program. The funds were used to match a federal Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) grant to the Maryland Broadband Cooperative to increase the fiber network in Allegany and Garrett counties. The project installed over seven miles of fiber across the region and connected an additional 44 route miles of fiber. This connectivity allows Cooperative members (over 60 ISPs) to provide lit fiber services to eight industrial parks across the western half of the region. The project fulfilled the need of critical infrastructure and was completed in June 2019.

At first glance this project seems like merely an installation project but should be viewed as a major success in cooperation between non-profits and many branches of private and public entities. Pole attachment agreements were required with several private companies, an MOU with the City of Cumberland was executed to utilize their existing fiber, the state of Maryland increased the amount of fiber the Cooperative is able to utilize in its resource sharing agreement and the State Highway Administration permitted the usage of its Frostburg facility as the location of a new Point of Presence.

In addition, State, Federal, Regional, County and municipal resources combined with additional resources of the Maryland Broadband Cooperative is what made this project possible. This clearly could not have been done without the involvement of many stakeholders. As one of the top recommendations of the Governor's Maryland Broadband Taskforce, we were able to leverage existing assets to expand and offer new services.

Impacts of the project include supporting direct interconnects at the Dennett Road Data Center in Garrett County, bringing service to three previously unconnected laterals along MD Route 36, MD Route 220 and downtown Frostburg. Additionally, services are now available on the Cumberland Fiber footprint and eight business and industrial parks.

One of the more notable achievements of this project is the creation of a fiber ring throughout Garrett and Western Allegany County. The creation of this ring means that redundant services are now available which equates to less chance of an outage of service. For businesses this proves to be nearly as important as the broadband itself as companies relying on broadband would essentially be closed if a loss in service was experienced.

"The work we completed in Western Maryland with the support of the Appalachian Regional Commission, Departments of Commerce & Information Technology, and Tri-County Council expands the Maryland Broadband network in this region to the benefit of our entire membership," said Drew Van Dopp, President & CEO of the Maryland Broadband Cooperative, Inc. "Our ISP membership is already asking for both new and expanded services from these new fiber assets to serve the citizens in Allegany and Garrett counties. We couldn't be more pleased."
